Teachers

Objectives:

- To find out about and describe the basic needs of animals (for food, water and fresh air).
- To understand that all animals have other needs such as exercise, shelter and companionship for a good quality life (to be happy and healthy).
- To appreciate that we have responsibilities towards the animals who are in our care such as companion animals and that all animals should be treated with respect.




Starter activity:

- Using the Five freedoms activity on the IWB, point out each of the images illustrating the Five freedoms and ask the children which freedom each picture relates to. If you don't have use of an IWB, display on the whiteboard the images illustrating each of the Five freedoms.
- Use this exercise to explain what the Five freedoms are.

Main activity:

- Form children into pairs or mixed-ability groups of three or four and provide each group with a Five Freedoms worksheet, set of pictures illustrating each of the Five freedoms and a set of Situations cards.
- Tell children to stick the pictures illustrating each of the Five freedoms in the correct positions on the worksheet.





• Using the IWB talk pupils through the activity. Take a Situation card such as:

Guinea pig drinking from a full water bottle

- Ask children which freedom it relates to (**Freedom from hunger and thirst**) and whether or not it shows that freedom being met or not (it is being met as a full water bottle has been provided).
- Place the card in the correct place under the correct heading in the table on the IWB. Ask children to stick the relevant situation card in the correct position on their Five freedoms worksheet.
- Take another Situation card such as:

Mother pig in a farrowing crate

- Display the image of a pig in a farrowing crate and explain that it shows a pen that mother pigs are usually kept in when they are farmed indoors on a 'factory farm'. It is designed to stop them lying on their piglets. Mother pigs kept outside on 'free-range' farms are not put in crates because they have plenty of room and so would not lie on their offspring.
- Again, ask children which freedom it relates to. Point out that several cards, like this one, may be put in more than one place on the chart – Freedom to express normal behaviour and Freedom from discomfort.
- Once you have established that the children understand what the task entails ask groups to place the Situations cards in the correct place on their own Five freedoms worksheet. They may want initially to use blutac, or something similar, to fix them in place.
- Tell the children to ask if there are any labels that they don't understand.
- They may not understand what a 'battery' cage is for example. To explain it may be useful to display the image of egg-laying hens in 'enriched battery cages' and tell them that chickens who are reared indoors on 'factory' farms are kept inside small cages. This means lots of them can be kept in a small space and it is easier for the farmer to collect the eggs.

Plenary:

- Ask representatives from each group to come up to the board and, using their completed worksheet, place a card in the correct place in the table in the IWB activity. Take a vote and/or discuss whether they are correct.
- Discuss any that children are not sure about or that they disagree over.
- Allocate to each of the groups a different situation where animals' freedoms are not met and ask them to discuss what could be done to change these situations and to suggest whose responsibility it is to see that the animals' needs are met.



Optional lesson development:

• Show the poster '5 Freedoms for animals' produced by an Australian group called ThinkKind. Ask students to create their own posters to promote the' five freedoms' for animals.


